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3	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: All right. I'll
4	call this meeting to order of the Town of
5	Orangetown Sanitation Commission. This is
6	for the purpose of a public hearing based on
7	the request for a consideration of a yeah,
8	I'll get to that for a rate adjustment.
9	We'll have the roll call.
10	THE CLERK: Chairman Skip Vezzetti?
11	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Here.
12	THE CLERK: Bill Beckmann?
13	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Here.
14	THE CLERK: Chris Huber?
15	BOARD MEMBER HUBER: Here.
16	THE CLERK: Tom Simeti?
17	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Here.
18	THE CLERK: Rick Pakola, Deputy Town
19	Attorney?
20	MR. PAKOLA: Here.
21	THE CLERK: And myself, acting Clerk to
22	the Sanitation Commission, Stephen Munno.
23	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: All right. The
24	first thing that we have is, I'll ask our
25	attorney Richard Pakola to enter any exhibits

2	for the Board, like the petition, onto the
3	record, into the record.
4	MR. PAKOLA: Yes. And according to the
5	town code, all exhibits have to be
6	recommended by me to be admitted, and then
7	there's a vote. And I recommend that the
8	Commission itself introduce three exhibits on
9	its own.
10	So Commission Exhibit 1 is Mr. Brenner's
11	petition for this hearing.
12	Commission Exhibit Number 2 is two
13	documents. It's an affidavit of publication
14	by the Rockland County Times. And Mr. Munno
15	just handed me the second affidavit of
16	publication we published in two newspapers.
17	And the second is with the Journal News.
18	And then Commission Exhibit Number 3 is
19	the Town Board's previous resolution relating
20	to the current rates. And that is a one-page
21	document. And that's Resolution 283 from
22	June 14, 2022.
23	And I recommend that those be admitted
24	as Commission Exhibits 1 through 3. And
25	there should be a vote on that.

2	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: All right. We have
3	a recommendation from our attorney. Can we
4	have a motion?
5	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: A point of
6	clarity. Just a question about
7	clarification. The order of the exhibits,
8	what's the, what is the order of the exhibits
9	again?
10	MR. PAKOLA: Commission Exhibit 1 is
11	Mr. Brenner's letter dated October 27, 2023.
12	Commission Exhibit Number 2 is the two
13	affidavits of publication. It's two
14	documents in Exhibit Number 2. And
15	Commission Exhibit Number 3 is a one-page
16	document, and that is the Resolution
17	Number 284 from the Town Board meeting of
18	June 14, 2022.
19	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Got it. Thank
20	you. I see that we have a copy of that. I'm
21	sorry.
22	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Do you have a copy?
23	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Yes.
24	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Okay.
25	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: I gave him my

1 Proceedings 2 copy. 3 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Here, I got another 4 copy. 5 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Thank you. 6 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: I think I have 7 another one. Yeah, I have multiple copies. 8 All right. So we have a motion made by 9 Mr. Beckmann. 10 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Second it. 11 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Second. All in 12 favor? 13 (Response of aye was given.) 14 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: All right. Now I 15 will entertain a presentation by Mr. Brenner 16 representing the garbage haulers. 17 MR. BRENNER: Okay. As the board is 18 well aware from my October 27th letter, which 19 was caused by the fact that the landfill 20 operation is going to be increasing charges 21 based on discharge of the material at the 22 Rockland transfer station. I then have 23 supporting documentations which I have marked 24 as Exhibit A, B, C, and D. And primarily, 25 they are the comparable charges being charged

2	by our sister towns based on the fact of the
3	increase. And I would like we can discuss
4	it, or I would like that placed into the
5	record so that we understand why we're asking
6	for these increases.
7	MR. PAKOLA: And I would recommend these
8	be admitted as well, subject to someone
9	explaining what they are, someone testifying
10	as what they are. Mr. Brenner, you do plan
11	to have someone testify?
12	MR. BRENNER: Yes, I do. Mr. Hiep.
13	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Counsel, why don't
14	we have someone testify as to the basis of
15	the admission of the documents before we
16	admit the documents.
17	MR. PAKOLA: Okay. I just, I think it's
18	a foregone conclusion that someone is. But
19	we'll do that.
20	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Who swears him in?
21	MR. PAKOLA: I will. But Mr. Brenner,
22	are you ready to call your first witness?
23	MR. BRENNER: Yes, I am.
24	MR. PAKOLA: Okay.
25	MR. BRENNER: Kenneth Hiep, who is the

2	owner of Hiep Sanitation Company. All right.
3	MR. PAKOLA: Mr. Hiep, if you can raise
4	your right hand. Do you swear that the
5	evidence you're about to give before this
6	Commission shall be the truth, the whole
7	truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you
8	God?
9	MR. HIEP: I do.
10	MR. BRENNER: And your full name for the
11	record?
12	MR. HIEP: Kenneth Hiep.
13	MR. PAKOLA: And your residence or
14	business address for the record?
15	MR. HIEP: 22 Snake Hill Road, West
16	Nyack, New York.
17	MR. PAKOLA: And Mr. Brenner had
18	mentioned I think partially what your
19	relationship is to his petition, but what is
20	your relationship to this petition?
21	MR. HIEP: I own Kenneth Hiep
22	Incorporated with my brother, Robert Hiep
23	Incorporated, Rockland Wastepaper LLC. Those
24	are my companies that are licensed in
25	Orangetown.

1 Proceedings 2 MR. PAKOLA: Thank you. Mr. Brenner, 3 the witness is yours. MR. BRENNER: Okay. Mr. Hiep, you have 4 5 gone through this the data. Would you like 6 to explain originally how you put the data 7 together and for what reasons? 8 MR. PAKOLA: So tell us which exhibit 9 you're looking at when you're talking about 10 it. 11 MR. HIEP: Okay. Give me one moment so 12 I can --13 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Speak so that the 14 court reporter can hear you. 15 MR. HIEP: You got it. So in the past, 16 we've always compared with similar towns. 17 Let's start with Orangetown. Let's start 18 with Stony Point. Stony Point. 19 MR. PAKOLA: So if you're talking about 20 an exhibit, please tell us which one. 21 MR. HIEP: Which is A, B, and C. 22 MR. BRENNER: We're going to make 23 Stony Point A, all right. 24 MR. PAKOLA: No, I've already marked 25 them.

2	MR. BRENNER: Oh, you did. All right.
3	MR. HIEP: Just tell me what it is.
4	What's Stony Point?
5	MR. BRENNER: It's the last one, then.
6	MR. PAKOLA: So that was D. The last
7	one is D.
8	MR. BRENNER: It would be D.
9	MR. HIEP: Okay. And what's Orangetown?
10	MR. BRENNER: Orangetown would be B.
11	MR. HIEP: And Clarkstown?
12	MR. BRENNER: C.
13	MR. HIEP: What's the main sheet with
14	everything on it?
15	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: A.
16	MR. HIEP: Okay. So maybe we should
17	start with A. So this is a list of the
18	residential garbage pick ups. The first
19	column is Orangetown. It would it's
20	\$33.50 as of January. We added \$4.60. It's
21	20 cents on the dollar. So it's a \$23
22	increase. So it's \$4.60, 20 cents times.
23	This is the same formula we used in
24	Clarkstown, and the same formula being used
25	in Stony Point. Except in Stony Point, it's

2	in their they have an actual contract. So
3	they don't have to have a meeting. So if
4	this dumping goes up next year, it's 20 cents
5	on the dollar. It's in the contract. Which
6	is not a bad idea.
7	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Could you just
8	explain 20 cents on the dollar for us?
9	MR. HIEP: So this is what yeah.
10	20 cents on the increase. So here.
11	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: So what's the
12	current rate?
13	MR. HIEP: I'll make this I know what
14	you're asking. So the tipping fee is \$76.
15	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: That's the
16	current tipping fee.
17	MR. HIEP: Current. It's going to 99.
18	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Just a
19	clarification. When you say \$76
20	MR. HIEP: Per ton.
21	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Per ton. Okay.
22	Just so you understand, we're creating a
23	record for the Town Board
24	MR. HIEP: Oh, okay.
25	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: to consider our

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1 Proceedings 2 recommendation to either approve or deny the 3 request. 4 MR. HIEP: I understand. So I'll go a 5 little slower. 6 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Thank you. 7 MR. HIEP: So currently it's \$76 per 8 ton. 9 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: And it's going 10 to 99. MR. HIEP: Yes. 11 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: That's a 12 13 30 percent increase. 14 MR. HIEP: Yes. It's \$23, and it's 15 30 percent increase. So since you're putting 16 it in that terms, \$4.60 is 14 percent 17 increase. The 20 cents on the dollar on the 18 household charge of \$33.50 is 14 percent. So 19 it's not much to ask. It's very fair. I'll 20 wait for you to finish. 21 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: I'm just doing 22 the math. 23 MR. HIEP: I just did \$4.60 divided by 24 \$33.50. 25 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: That's

2	14 percent. 13-point
3	MR. HIEP: So that's why it's very fair.
4	It's not like we're asking for 30 percent.
5	So this is in Clarkstown. You can see the
6	numbers. The big difference here.
7	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: You take \$33.50.
8	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Right now it's
9	\$33.50.
10	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: If it's on the
11	record, please.
12	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: The math is
13	\$33.50 plus \$4.60 is \$38.10. The \$4.60
14	represents the 14 percent increase for the
15	they're proposing for the town rate.
16	MR. HIEP: Per unit.
17	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Per unit. And
18	at the same time, the County Solid Waste
19	Authority, Rockland Green, whatever they call
20	themselves, went from \$76 per ton to \$99 per
21	ton, which is a 30 percent increase, or \$23
22	per ton increase.
23	MR. HIEP: Okay. So what would you guys
24	like? Would you like me to go over this one
25	at a time? What would you like me to do?

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Proceedings
MR. PAKOLA: I would suggest that.
CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Yeah, so it's
entered into the record.
MR. HIEP: Okay. So Stony Point is
\$33.35 now. I'm using their number, the
\$4.60. And each year it goes up 50 percent.
BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: 50 cents.
MR. HIEP: 50 cents, I'm sorry.
BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Not 50 percent.
MR. HIEP: Which is only 1.31 percent of
an increase. Okay. We had that deal from
two years ago. I'm keeping it to 50 cents on
our agreed deal, very similar to Stony Point.
BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: So what you're
talking about, going to \$38.10 plus 50 cents,
which is \$38.60. And then going from
MR. HIEP: Yeah. I did it differently.
It went from \$33.50, then 34 plus
BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Plus the \$4.60.
MR. HIEP: Exactly. So we're keeping
our original deal from '22 or '21.
So what I do want to bring to your
attention is the 1.3 percent per year is
nothing these days. Everybody knows what

2	things cost. And just the cost of living is
3	over 3 percent.
4	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: That deal was
5	negotiated under a prior presidential
6	administration.
7	MR. HIEP: I'm not listen. I'm being
8	very fair. But I want to bring you to the
9	Town of Clarkstown. \$38.08. Next year,
10	\$1.34 increase, 3.5 percent. That is a more
11	reasonable for these days and times. Three
12	and a half percent is probably still light
13	with what's going on lately. So I feel here,
14	by the end of what we're up to, 206, in 2008,
15	they'll be paying 44. You'll be paying 39.
16	Well, 2006, I'm sorry. \$41.80, and you'll be
17	paying 39.
18	MR. BRENNER: '26.
19	MR. HIEP: Yeah, '26, I'm sorry. I went
20	to the end. They're a five year.
21	So I feel like I'm being very fair here.
22	I'm keeping with that small 50 cent increase.
23	And I'll just keeping up to par with
24	everybody else. If it wasn't for the dump
25	going up, I wouldn't be asking for anything.

2	But all the supervisors voted on this.
3	It's County Green. Every supervisor on that
4	board. And they've left it alone since 2020.
5	Commercial stops, they raise it to 99 in
6	2020. They raise it another, to 108 in '22,
7	and it's now 124.
8	So they've left the residents for as
9	long as they can. They've actually been
10	increasing the commercials, I think, to make
11	up for the residents. And I hope they leave
12	the commercials alone for a while because
13	it's huge. It's a lot of money.
14	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Okay.
15	MR. HIEP: Any questions?
16	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Any questions from
17	the Board.
18	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: With respect to
19	the documents that the petitioner is seeking
20	to introduce, A, B, C, and D, these were
21	documents that were generated by the
22	petitioner; is that correct?
23	MR. BRENNER: That is correct.
24	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: And these were
25	documents that were generated from

1 Proceedings information in the --2 3 MR. HIEP: I have copies of the 4 contracts from Stony Point. I have a page 5 contract from my Clarkstown. 6 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: With you? 7 MR. HIEP: Yeah. I can, I can --BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: 8 I just want a 9 representation on the record that the 10 documents reflect entries that are --11 MR. HIEP: I'm not making these up. 12 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Just for the 13 record. Because they're not official 14 documents there. 15 MR. HIEP: I understand. 16 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: They're petitioner 17 generated. 18 MR. HIEP: No problem. 19 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: All right. Any 20 other questions? 21 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Help me 22 understand. How many households might be 23 contemplated? The garbage from how many 24 households would be contemplated at a time? 25 MR. HIEP: It's very hard to figure out

2	because you have four people in one house.
3	One old person. About half I think is very
4	fair. Like, you know, that's why I broke it
5	down into percentages for you. Like, they're
6	raising me 30 percent. It's half the
7	increase. It's probably close to about half.
8	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: So for example
9	MR. HIEP: Half of the \$30.
10	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: So if you know,
11	how many households do you have in
12	Orangetown?
13	MR. HIEP: Around 8,000.
14	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: 8,000, okay.
15	MR. HIEP: Around.
16	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: So, and there
17	would be a corresponding number in any given
18	year. So let's say you have 8,000 presently
19	in 2023; is that correct?
20	MR. HIEP: Approximately.
21	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Approximately.
22	MR. HIEP: Within a thousand.
23	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Within a thousand.
24	MR. HIEP: Yeah. About 8,000. Yeah,
25	you know. I have a lot of seniors.

1 Proceedings 2 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Oh, you give a 3 break to seniors? MR. HIEP: Yes. 4 5 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Oh, yeah. 6 Absolutely. 7 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Is that in our 8 resolution? 9 MR. HIEP: Forever. 10 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Forever, yes. 11 Especially since we got old. 12 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Well, the 13 seniors use really less garbages. 14 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Mr. Chairman, I'd 15 like to take a recess. I want to confer with 16 members. 17 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Okay. Can we go 18 into executive session? 19 BOARD MEMBER SIMETT: Yeah. 20 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Okay. So at this 21 point, we'll go into executive session. And 22 we'll call you back. 23 (Recess taken.) 24 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: All right, we're 25 going to go back into session. I'm going to

3	MR. PAKOLA: All right. Were there any
4	further questions?
5	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Oh, are there any
6	further questions? Excuse me.

8	Board had an opportunity to discuss the
9	presentation. There was a question as to
10	whether or not the petitioner received a
11	letter from Rockland Green confirming the
12	increase, the amount, and when it became
13	effected.
14	MR. HIEP: The Thursday after we met,
15	they voted.
16	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: I'm actually, I'm
17	aware of the vote, but
18	MR. BRENNER: It will take effect on
19	January
20	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: He was at the
21	meeting.
22	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: I came a little
23	late. But for the record.
24	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: He just wants it on
25	the record, a copy of it.

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1 Proceedings 2 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Is there a 3 document that you've received from Rockland 4 Green? 5 MR. HIEP: That it is definitely \$99. 6 MR. PAKOLA: Yes, yes, yes. 7 MR. HIEP: I'm sure I can get one sent 8 to you. 9 MR. BRENNER: Hold on. Here it is. I 10 have it. 11 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Or a copy of the 12 resolution. 13 MR. PAKOLA: Let's mark that 14 Petitioner's E. CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: This is the one from 15 16 February 7, 2003. MR. BRENNER: Rockland Green --17 18 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: I just want a copy 19 of the --20 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: So just we have an 21 understanding, because we're approving based 22 on a representation based upon a global 23 expectation. 24 MR. BRENNER: This letter went to the 25 supervisor saying it's going to \$99.

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1 Proceedings 2 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: We have that one. 3 MR. BRENNER: Oh, okay. 4 MR. PAKOLA: Mr. Simeti is asking a 5 question. 6 CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Okay. Tom? 7 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Yes, thank you. 8 Please, if you would. 9 MR. HIEP: I tried calling Jerry Damiani 10after that. He was with lawyers all day. 11 I'm sure it went to \$99. If you can pass a 12 motion, and then we forward you a letter from 13 the County --14 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Yeah, put a 15 condition on it. 16 MR. HIEP: -- would that be sufficient? 17 Condition on it being \$99. 18 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: And the 19 effective --20 MR. HIEP: I still call it. BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: That sounds more 21 22 like what we're looking for in the first 23 instance. 24 MR. HIEP: It's just going to be \$99. 25 BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Some formal

3	that otherwise provides the Rockland Green
4	that provides the amount of the increase,
5	when it becomes effective.
6	MR. HIEP: It's \$99.
7	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: I respect the
8	representation and our global expectation.
9	But we just want something, because we're
10	approving this rate, we're considering this
11	rate
12	MR. HIEP: Based on \$99.
13	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: based on the
14	representation that it was approved. It's
15	not there's no formal document in the
16	record that
17	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: That says it.
18	MR. HIEP: I understand.
19	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Okay. And then
20	the other thing that I think would be good is
21	just supply the backup for these, for
22	Stony Point and for Clarkstown.
23	MR. BRENNER: You want the formal
24	contract.
25	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Not the formal

2	contract, just a resolution, that's all.
3	That it was done.
4	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: I think, well
5	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: How do you call
6	it?
7	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: I think what
8	Mr. Beckmann is asking is for, you know, just
9	a formal documentation from the respective
10	towns that identify or support the
11	representation in the document being
12	submitted by the petitioner.
13	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: That's all.
14	PUBLIC SPEAKER: It's also on the
15	website, if you want to look it up, Rockland
16	Green.
17	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: But that's not our
18	burden here. So we ask that
19	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Okay. Counsel
20	can just submit it.
21	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: So the petitioner
22	understands our role and the process. Our
23	role is to make a record, to have this public
24	hearing, make a recommendation to the Town
25	Board. The Town Board is going to have a

2	record before it. It's going to have the
3	transcript for the proceeding, the documents
4	admitted and accepted by the Board, and to
5	support our recommendation. We would like to
6	make sure that we have sufficient
7	documentation and support our recommendation
8	so the Town Board accepts, obviously, what we

10	MR. HIEP: Okay. So can't you just
11	pending \$99, 20 cents on the dollar solves
12	the whole
13	MR. BRENNER: No, no. They're going
14	to

16	issue. Subject to getting the papers.
17	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: I'm only talking
18	about proof issues at this point. Now we're
19	going to address the increase, the
20	presentation of the increase.
21	MR. HIEP: Okay.
22	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: And this and a
23	vote.
24	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: All right.
25	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Is that right?

17	recommend approval as submitted, or something

20	is requesting an increase of \$4.60.
21	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: No. No, no, no, no,
22	no, no, no.
23	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Yeah, we
24	understand. I'm sorry.
25	MR. PAKOLA: Let's clarify that. Is

12	question. Why are you saying it's \$4.60
13	every year? It's only \$4.60 once, and then
14	50 cents every year.
15	MR. HIEP: It's the same thing. I added
16	the 50 cents at the first number. \$33,50,
17	\$4.35 see what I did.
18	BOARD MEMBER HUBER: Oh, yeah, I got
19	you.
20	MR. HIEP: I added it there. My
21	secretary I wanted it the other way.

We did an ton. 9 average of your calculation of tonnage, which 10 was \$14,000 average from both. 11 MR. HIEP: Hold on. 14 --12 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Thousand tons. 13 MR. HIEP: What is 14,000 tons? BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: That's what you 14 15 pay at the Solid Waste Authority. 16 (Discussion held off the record.) 17 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Okay, so we got 18 14,000 tons per year as an average for you, 19 based on the solid waste information. That 20 was the tonnage in Orangetown. 21 MR. HIEP: Okay. Robert or Kenneth? 22 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Ken. 23 MR. HIEP: Okay. 24 BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: Okay. One year 25 was 14,897. Other years, 12,830 for eleven

3	on. So it comes out to 14,000 times 23 is
4	322,000 a year, divided by 8,000, which is
5	your estimate of clients. And that comes out

9	explain what you're looking at so they can
10	get us the answer.
11	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: It's too the
12	statistics have become a little too
13	confusing. We need a better basis.

15	hearing, okay, the last hearing,
16	Mr. Vezzetti not Vezzetti, I'm sorry,
17	Mr. Simeti.
18	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Simeti.
19	MR. HIEP: He said we can use go, you

21	MR. BRENNER: Very specifically, he
22	brought this up at the last hearing, and we
23	were told we could not jam the numbers

10	calculations. What does it represent. You
11	know, tonnage at the landfill for 2022 and
12	2023 up to March, to November 3, 2023. So
13	we're trying to figure out, we know what the
14	carters in Orangetown are paying based on the
15	tons, and trying to figure out the cost
16	increase to the carter that's to be passed
17	along to the customer. And it's very simple.
18	MR. HIEP: It's really not. You left
19	out Robert Hiep Inc. You left out Rockland
20	Wastepaper LLC.
21	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: I think
22	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: That's not, that's
23	not
24	BOARD MEMBER BECKMANN: That's not
25	representative, then.

3	saying well, I wouldn't know the
4	difference. I don't know all the carters,
5	respectfully. I don't know all the names of
6	the carters that provide residential waste.
7	Is this this is residential waste, not

10	on it. So I think
11	BOARD MEMBER SIMETI: Oh, okay.
12	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: I think the issue, I
13	think the issue is the trying to calculate
14	this, a fair and reasonable increase, is very
15	difficult.
16	MR. HIEP: Isn't fair and reasonable the
17	same as every other town around here?
18	CHAIRMAN VEZZETTI: Well, we have to
19	the Board feels that I know. But the
20	Board feels that we have a responsibility to
21	present a, you know, the facts as best we can
22	get them based on certain statistics.
23	The other point I want to bring up is on
24	this one. When we did look at it, we
25	thought didn't we think, feel that this



- 4) Do Clarkstown and Stony Point have curbside pickup or at the house?
- 5) Do the carters have a written contract with Clarkstown or Stony Point? If so, please provide a copy.
- 6) Why is the residential charge for garbage pick-up in Haverstraw so much less than Clarkstown, Stony Point and Orangetown (\$26.75 starting 2024)?
- 7) What is the current charge per residential unit in Ramapo and has a rate been set for 2024?
- 8) Do any of the Towns regulate commercial pick up fees and, if so, how?
- 9) What is the senior citizen discount and how many accounts do you have with the discount?

Please provide this information as soon as possible so that we can move forward with the special Town Board meeting Monday. My understanding is that some of this was asked for at the hearing before the Sanitation Commission but never provided.

Addendum B

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made this 2²⁰ day of <u>March</u>, 2022, by and between the TOWN OF STONY POINT, Rockland County, New York (hereinafter referred to as the Town), a municipal corporation, organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, having its principal place of business at 74 East Main Street, Stony Point, New York; VIGNOLA SANITATION CORPORATION, having its principal place of business at P.O. Box 611, Stony Point, New York 10980; and CARLO MINUTO CARTING COMPANY, INC., having its principal place of business at P.O. Box 234, 20 West Snake Hill Road, West Nyack New York 10994 (hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Carters").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Town of Stony Point and the Carters licensed under an existing agreement to provide residential sanitation services to the residents of the Town of Stony Point continue to work together in an effort to provide quality sanitation services to the residents of the Town at reasonable rates; and

WHEREAS, the Town and the Carters previously entered into an Agreement dated March 1, 2010 providing for certain terms and conditions concerning residential carting services within the Town; and

WHEREAS, the Town and the Carters previously entered into a subsequent Agreement dated March 1, 2019 providing for certain terms and conditions concerning residential carting services within the Town; and

WHEREAS, said proposal is in the best interest of the Town and the residential carters licensed to provide said residential sanitation services to the residents of the Town;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Town and the Carters for the consideration hereinbefore named agree as follows:

ARTICLE I: Term and Work Included.

1. Commencing March 1, 2022 and continuing through February 29, 2028, and any renewal period thereafter, the present licensed carters named in this agreement shall have the right, subject to compliance with all legal requirements, to continue to provide curbside residential sanitation service for a single-family residence located in the Town of Stony Point. The monthly rates for this service shall be as follows:

- A. Effective March 1, 2022, will be Thirty-two and 35/100 (\$32.35) Dollars per single-family residence.
- B. Effective March 1, 2023, will be Thirty-two and 85/100 (\$32.85) Dollars per single-family residence.

- C. Effective March 1, 2024, will be Thirty-three and 35/100 (\$33.35) Dollars per single-family residence.
- D. Effective March 1, 2025, will be Thirty-three and 85/100 (\$33.85) Dollars per single-family residence.
- E. Effective March 1, 2026, will be Thirty-four and 35/100 (\$34.35) Dollars per single-family residence.
- F. Effective March 1, 2027, will be Thirty-four and 85/100 (\$34.85) Dollars per single-family residence.

2. On or after December 15, 2027, the Carters and the Town shall in good faith consider whether to enter into a new agreement under such terms and conditions mutually agreeable to both parties.

3. In addition to the monthly rate provided in paragraph 1, each Carter shall be entitled to add \$1.00 per month to the previously quoted monthly rate for every full \$5.00 increase from the present \$76.00 per ton tipping fee charged at the County controlled transfer station where the residential waste is deposited. Such \$1.00 increase will be the only increase permitted during the term of this agreement for any increase in the cost for dumping or "tipping fees" However, should the Town require the carters to dispose of said garbage and bulk items at a facility located outside of the North Rockland area, i.e.; Town and/or Village of Haverstraw, Stony Point, then the carters are entitled to an additional \$1.00 increase in the monthly rate for residential sanitation service disposal costs.

4. The Carters also agree that upon written request of any resident owner of a singlefamily residence serviced by said Carters and upon proof of senior citizenship status that said senior citizen resident shall be entitled to receive a \$1.00 discount per month from the amount so billed.

5. The Carters agree that they will provide each and every residential customer at least one day per month allocated to bulk item pick-up day.

* Definition of bulk items: discardable household items of a durable nature, such as home furnishings, i.e. sofas, chairs, storm/screen windows and doors, floor coverings, carpeting and padding, tightly rolled, bundled and tied; small quantities of the following material. Not more than two (2) bundles, no longer than five (5) feet or heavier than fifty (50) pounds each, or containers with a combined weight of no more than one hundred (100) pounds will be collected.

The following materials are not included in the monthly bulk program but are the responsibility of the "do it yourself" homeowner, or agreement made between the homeowner and his professional home improvement/trade contractor, or residential carter: Furnaces and boilers; Building materials from renovation – decks, porches, sheds and fences, materials from clearing land – tree stumps, grass clippings, soil, rocks, concrete and asphalt; Paint or other hazardous waste type products collected by the County of Rockland at the Fire Training site.

ARTICLE II: No Collusion or Fraud.

The Carters hereby agree that the only person or persons interested as principal or principals in the bid or Proposal submitted by the Carters for this Agreement are named herein, and that no other person other than those mentioned herein has any interest in the above named proposal or in the securing of the permit or agreement, and this Agreement has been secured without connection with any person or persons other than those named, and that the proposal is in all respects fair and was prepared, and this Agreement secured without collusion or fraud and that neither any official nor employee of the Town has or shall have a financial interest in the performance of this Agreement or in the supplies, work, or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.

ARTICLE III: Right to Suspend Work and Cancel Agreement.

1. It is further mutually agreed that if any time during the execution of the work, the Town Board shall determine that the work pursuant to this Agreement is not being performed according to this Agreement and/or the permit requirements, the Town may suspend or stop the Carters' work pursuant to this Agreement.

2. Whenever the Town determines to suspend or stop work under this Agreement, written notice shall be sent by certified mail to the Carters at its provided address, and the Carters shall be entitled to a Hearing before the Town Board on whether or not this Agreement has been violated. Any violation of this Agreement shall be established by a preponderance of evidence.

ARTICLE IV: Insurance.

1. The Carters shall procure and maintain at their own expense and without expense to the Town, liability insurance for damages imposed by law, of the kinds and in the amount as follows: \$1,000,000 per person for bodily injury, \$1,000,000 each accident (aggregate), and \$500,000 for each property claim, \$2,000,000 each accident (aggregate). The Carters shall also obtain at its sole expense, the statutory limits for Worker's Compensation, said insurance to be procured from the insurance companies authorized to do such business in the State of New York, covering all operations under this Agreement, whether performed by the Carters or by any subcontractor and shall maintain such insurance in force for the duration of this Agreement. All insurance policies required under this Agreement shall include in addition to the Carters' name, the following named additional insured parties: The Town of Stony Point.

2. Before commencing the work pursuant to this Agreement, the Carters shall furnish to the Town Clerk, a certificate or certificates of insurance, in a form satisfactory to the Town showing compliance with this Article. All insurance shall be issued by companies authorized to do business in the State of New York who have certificates of solvency, and shall have a thirty (30) day non-cancelable clause. In the event of the cancellation, said policy shall be replaced by an equivalent insurance prior to the cancellation date.

ARTICLE V: Compliance With Laws.

1. The Carters shall comply with all the provisions of the Laws of the State of New York and of the United States of America which affect municipalities and municipal contracts and more particularly the Labor Law, the General Municipal Law, the Worker's Compensation Law, the Lien Law, the Personal Property Law, State Unemployment Insurance Law, Federal Social Security Law, Department of Labor Occupational Safety and Health Act, Executive Orders, State, Local and Municipal Health Laws, rules and regulations and any and all regulations promulgated by the State of New York and/or amendments and additions thereto insofar as the same shall be applicable to any contract awarded hereunder, with the same force and effect as if set forth at length herein.

2. The Carters shall file for and obtain all required permits and obtain inspections as specified herein, and as required by law, including a Town residential carter permit. All permits and fees shall be paid for by the Carters. In the event of a conflict between this agreement and the permit requirements, the permit requirements shall control. However, to the extent there are any requirements or provisions in this Agreement that are in addition to the permit requirements, such additional provisions or requirements shall not be deemed a conflict.

ARTICLE VI: Assignments.

This Agreement may not be assigned by the Carters without the express written permission of the Town.

ARTICLE VII: Successors.

This agreement shall bind the successors and representatives of the parties hereto.

ARTICLE VIII: Defense of Actions or Suits.

Neither the Town nor any of its officers or agents shall in any manner be answerable or responsible for any loss or damage that shall or may happen by reason of this Agreement, nor shall it be in any manner answerable or responsible for any injury done, for damages or compensation required to be paid under any present or future law, to any person or persons whomever, whether employees of the Carters or otherwise, or for damages to any person or property, whether belonging to the Town or to others, occurring or to others, occurring during, or resulting by reason of this Agreement. Against all such injuries, damages and compensation, the Carters shall and will properly guard. The Carters shall also at all times indemnify and save harmless the Town and its Employees, against all such injuries, damages and compensation arising or resulting from the performance of this Agreement. The Carters shall carry liability insurance in the sums required under this Agreement for the complete duration of this Agreement.

ARTICLE IX: Verbal Statements Not Binding.

It is understood and agreed that the written terms and provisions of this Agreement shall supersede all prior verbal statements of the Town or other representatives of the Town, and such statements shall not be effective or be construed as entering, forming part of, or otherwise altering the written agreement in any manner.

ARTICLE X: No Waiver of Rights.

Any remedy provided in this Agreement shall be taken and construed as in addition to each and every other remedy herein provided; and in addition to all other suits, actions or legal proceedings, the Town shall be entitled as of right to a writ of injunction against any breach of any of the provisions of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XI: Notice Procedures.

1. Any notice from one party to the other, under this Agreement, shall be in writing and shall be dated and signed by the party giving such notice, or by a duly authorized representative of such party.

2. All inquiries between parties of this Agreement pertaining to details, progress and coordination of the work shall be considered binding only when in writing and directed from the Carters through the Town Clerk or from the Town, when directed to the Carters designated representative.

ARTICLE XII: Governing Law

This Agreement shall be governed by the Laws of New York, without regard to choice of law provisions and the venue of any action or proceeding shall be deemed to be Rockland County, New York.

ARTICLE XIII: Successors and Assignees.

This Agreement shall be binding upon and shall be for the benefit of the parties, subsidiaries, affiliates, heirs, successors, legal representatives and assigns of each of the parties hereto, to the fullest extent permitted by law, except that where any purported assignment is made without the express written consent of the Town, the provisions of this agreement shall not apply to such unauthorized assignee.

ARTICLE XIV: Severability and Interpretation.

In the event that any Court or tribunal declares any provision of this Agreement as unenforceable, contrary to law or otherwise denies effect to any provision of this Agreement, it is the express intention of the parties that all other aspects of this Agreement remain in full force and effect in all other respects.

ARTICLE XV: Effective Date.

This Agreement is effective upon execution by all parties.

ARTICLE XVI: Counterparts.

This Agreement has been prepared for execution by each of the parties which may be executed in any number of counterparts, all of which, when taken together, shall constitute a single agreement. Electronic, PDF or facsimile signatures shall be deemed to be original signatures of the signing party if presented to the other party as a signed document.

ARTICLE XVII. Entire Agreement.

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement among the parties, and nothing more nor less than the contents of this Agreement is intended by the parties. Nothing in this Agreement may be changed unless accomplished by a written agreement signed by both parties.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Town of Stony Point caused its seal to be affixed hereunto, and these presents to be signed by its Supervisor, and to be attested by its Town Clerk, both duly authorized so to do; and the Carters have hereunto caused its corporate seal to be affixed hereunto and these presents to be signed and to be attested to as both being duly authorized to so do the day and year first above mentioned.
