**LOCAL LAW NO. 10 2025
OF THE INCORPORATED TOWN OF ORANGETOWN, NEW YORK
TOWN BOARD TO AMEND CHAPTER 43 OF THE TOWN CODE
RELATED TO ADDITIONAL BULK REGULATIONS AND EXCEPTIONS
FOR ACCESSORY STRUCTURES.**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE TOWN BOARD OF THE TOWN OF ORANGETOWN AS FOLLOWS:

Additions are underlined, Deletions are stricken. The said section of the Code is amended as follows:

As amended, Chapter 43 of the Town Code of the Town of Orangetown, originally adopted by the Town Board 7-7-1969 by LL No. 4-1969 and as thereafter amended, are hereby amended as follows:

Section 1.

Chapter 43

Article V Additional Bulk Regulations

§5.152 Spacing of multiple residential buildings. No multiple residential buildings shall be closer to any other multiple building on the same lot than the height of the taller of the two buildings.

§5.153 Location of accessory buildings or structures.

- a) No accessory building, or structure, ~~except a fence or swimming pool,~~ shall be closer to any principal building or to any other accessory building or structure (including swimming pools) ~~than a distance equal to the height of such accessory building or structure, of less than eight feet , and in no event less than 15 feet ,~~ unless it is attached to and is a part of such principal building,
- b) Trellises, pavilions and similar "non-permanent" structures that are 144 square feet or less shall have a separation distance of at least three feet from another building or structure.
- c) Accessory buildings or structures shall conform to the bulk regulations of the district, except that none shall be located in a front yard.
- d) Swimming pools accessory to multifamily residences shall not be closer than 50 feet to any lot line.

~~Inground swimming pools accessory to one- or two-family residences shall not be located closer than eight feet to the principal building.~~

Section 2.

Chapter 43

Article V Additional Bulk Regulations

§5.2 Exceptions to bulk regulations.

§5.227 Accessory buildings in required rear or side yards. A building or structure, except a swimming pool, accessory to a single-family or two-family dwelling in any district, except R-80 and R-40, may be located in any required rear or side yard, provided that it does not exceed 15 feet in height, it is set back five feet from any lot line, and all such buildings in the aggregate shall not occupy more than 30% of the area of the required rear or side yard.

- a) Accessory buildings constructed at the same time may be located, in no more than one pairs or groups in the required rear or side yard along the common side lot line or rear lot line of contiguous lots. Swimming pools may be set back not less than 20

feet from the rear lot line in all residential zones other than RG. In RG Zones, the setback from the rear lot line for swimming pools will not be less than 10 feet.

- b) A portable building not over 144 square feet in area shall be permitted without a building permit on any residential lot in any rear or side yard, but no closer than five feet one foot to any property line.

Section 3.

Chapter 43

Article XI Definitions and Word Usage

§11.2 Definitions

ACCESSORY

The term applied to a building or use which is clearly incidental or subordinate to and customarily in connection with the principal building or use and which is located on the same lot with such principal building or use. No residential building, tourist cabin or summer colony cottage shall be considered as "accessory" to any residential building. However, one guesthouse, one caretaker's cottage or one servants' quarter may be considered as "accessory" to a residential use in R-80 only. Any "accessory" building attached to a principal building is deemed to be part of such principal building in applying the bulk regulations to such building. "Accessory" buildings, structures and uses shall not be subject to performance standards procedure, except as set forth in **§ 4.12**. A portable building not over 144 square feet in area shall be permitted without a building permit on any residential lot in any rear or side yard, but not closer than ~~five feet~~ one foot to any property line. Notwithstanding any other provisions in the Zoning Code to the contrary, vending machines and entertainment devices shall be deemed "accessory" to recreation establishments, such as bowling alleys, dance halls, billiard parlors, driving ranges and miniature golf courses; eating and drinking places; hotels and motels; and the same shall be permitted without a building permit. An establishment where the vending machines and entertainment devices are the principal use, such as an arcade, shall be subject to the requirement for a special permit found in the CS District, Column 3, Zoning Board, Note 9, and all such other zoning districts which refer to that note.

Section 4. Authority

This proposed Local Law is enacted and adopted pursuant to NYS Municipal Home Rule Law §10, and in accordance with the procedures prescribed in NYS Municipal Home Rule §20.

Section 5. Severability

If any section, subdivision, paragraph, clause or phrase of this Local Law shall be adjudged invalid, or held to be unconstitutional, by any court of competent jurisdiction, any judgment or order made thereby shall not affect the validity of this Local Law as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part or provision so adjudged to be invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 6. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect upon publishing and posting a copy in the manner prescribed by applicable laws, and upon filing a copy with the NYS Secretary of State.

ACCEPT PERFORMANCE BOND / GATTO LANE SITE PLAN / GATTO LANE, PEARL RIVER, NEW YORK**

WHEREAS, Toll Northeast V Corp., as owner of property located at Gatto Lane, Pearl River, New York (Tax Lot 68.07 Block 2 Lot 1), applied for and received subdivision plan approval from the Town of Orangetown Planning Board for said property, pursuant to Planning Board decision PB #24-27, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the aforesaid approvals, the Planning Board, at the recommendation of the Department of Environmental Management and Engineering, in its decisions identified as PB #25-13 required that the applicant post a Performance Bond in the amount of \$785,933.50 to ensure the construction and completion of certain public improvements pursuant to the aforesaid approvals, and

WHEREAS, the applicant has submitted a fully executed Performance Bond dated March 4, 2025, issued by Harco National Insurance Company, as Surety, on behalf of Toll Northeast V Corp., as principal, in the amount of \$785,933.50 naming the Town of Orangetown as beneficiary, to insure the completion of public improvements associated with the "Gatto Lane Site Plan," which Performance Bond has been approved as to form and substance by the Town Attorney's Office.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Town hereby formally accepts, receives and files with the Office of the Town Clerk a Performance Bond dated March 4, 2025, issued by Harco National Insurance Company, as Surety, on behalf of Toll Northeast V Corp., as principal, in the amount of \$785,933.50, naming the Town of Orangetown as beneficiary, to insure the completion of public improvements associated with the "Gatto Lane Site Plan" no later than March 4, 2027, and said bond to be returned only upon satisfactory completion of said public improvements according to the terms of said Bond, Planning Board decisions #24-27 and 25-13, any Town departments having jurisdiction thereof, and formal resolution of the Town Board.

**RESOLUTION NO. 318
ORANGETOWN HOUSING AUTHORITY/ CORRECTIVE ACTION RE: STAGGERED TERMS
OF APPOINTED MEMBERS**

WHEREAS, the Orangetown Housing Authority was established pursuant to Article III of the New York Public Housing Law (the "Enabling Act"), which Enabling Act grants and defines the powers and purposes of municipal housing authorities in the State of New York (the "State"), and Chapter 913 of the 1957 Laws of New York, as amended, constituting Section 442 of the New York Public Housing Law (collectively with the Enabling Act, the "Act").

N.Y. Public Housing Law §442. Orangetown Housing Authority states as follows:
"A municipal housing authority, to be known as the Orangetown Housing Authority, is hereby created and established for the town of Orangetown in the county of Rockland, for the accomplishment of any or all of the purposes specified in article eighteen of the constitution of the state of New York. It shall constitute a body corporate and politic, be perpetual in duration and **consist of five members**. It shall have the powers and duties now or hereafter conferred by this chapter upon municipal housing authorities. It shall be organized in the manner prescribed by and be subject to the provisions of this chapter, and the authority, its members, officers and employees and its operations and activities shall in all respects be governed by the provisions of this chapter." (emphasis added)

N.Y. Public Housing Law §30(2) states that:
"**Except as otherwise provided by special act of the legislature**, an authority shall consist of not less than three nor more than seven members The members of an authority who are first appointed shall be not more than five in number and shall be designated to serve for terms of one, two, three, four and five years respectively from the date of their appointment, depending upon the number of members constituting the authority. **Thereafter the term of office of appointive members shall be five years.**" (emphasis added).

WHEREAS, the Town Board by resolutions #237 through 241 of 2012 addressed errors in the staggering of terms which had occurred for some years prior.

WHEREAS, certain errors in the staggering of terms have again occurred so that adjustments must be made again.

RESOLUTION NO. 322

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 2024-266, a stop sign was installed on South Broadway, heading south, at the intersection of South Broadway and Elizabeth Place in South Nyack due to the limited sight distance caused by the temporary repair of the South Broadway bridge over the New York State Thruway; and,

Reason for Referral:

County Highways, County Facilities, County Regulated Streams, County Parks, DEC Piermont Recreational Area, Long Path Hiking Trail, State Highways, State Facilities, NYS Thruway, State Parks, Towns of Clarkstown and Ramapo, Villages of Chestnut Ridge, Grand View-on-Hudson, Nyack, and Piermont, Palisades Interstate Parkway

The County of Rockland Department of Planning has reviewed the above item. Acting under the terms of the above GML powers and those vested by the County of Rockland Charter, I, the Commissioner of Planning, hereby:

Recommend the Following Modifications

- 1 Section 5.227 originally states that a portable building not over 144 square feet shall be permitted no closer than five feet to any property line, while the amendment proposes to reduce this setback to one foot. Under Section 11.2, Definitions, "Accessory" includes the original text from Section 5.227 and requires a setback of five feet instead of one foot for portable buildings. The Town must update the definition for "Accessory" to be consistent with the proposed text amendment for Section 5.227.
- 2 Section 11.2 includes a definition for "Portable Structure" instead of "Portable Building." The latter term is used under the definition for "Accessory" and Section 5.227. It is recommended that a consistent term is used throughout the code so that it can be more easily administered and understood.
- 3 Pursuant to New York State General Municipal Law (GML) Sections 239-m and 239-n, if any of the conditions of this GML review are overridden by the board, then the local land use board must file a report with the County's Commissioner of Planning of the final action taken. If the final action is contrary to the

The review undertaken by the County of Rockland Department of Planning is pursuant to and follows the mandates of Article 12-B of the New York General Municipal Law. Under Article 12-B the County of Rockland does not render opinions nor determines whether the proposed action reviewed implicates the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act. The County of Rockland Department of Planning defers to the municipality referring the proposed action to render such opinions and make such determinations as appropriate under the circumstances.

In this respect, municipalities are advised that under the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act, the preemptive force of any provision of the Act may be avoided (1) by changing a policy or practice that may result in a substantial burden on religious exercise, (2) by retaining a policy or practice and exempting the substantially burdened religious exercise, (3) by providing exemptions from a policy or practice for applications that substantially burden religious exercise, or (4) by any other means that eliminates the substantial burden.

Pursuant to New York State General Municipal Law §§ 239-m and 239-n, the referring body shall file a report of its final action with the County of Rockland Department of Planning within thirty (30) days after the final action. A referring body that acts contrary to a recommendation of modification or disapproval of a proposed action shall set forth the reasons for the contrary action in such report.
